

Subject: Assisting community and agency responses to lead in water systems.

Directive of the Governor on Lead 16-06

- 1. School Rule [WAC 246-366A]
- 2. Lead rental inspection & registry
- 3. Child care providers / lead exposure
- 4. Blood lead level monitoring
- 5. Lead screening rates & case management
- 6. Removal of utility lead service lines
- 7. Seek additional federal assistance

- Funding for PFAS sampling


DOH Recommendation

The Department of Health recommends that the State Board of Health accept the petition and begin rulemaking to consider setting drinking water standards for specific compounds in the PFAS family of chemicals.

Legionella

- Ubiquitous
- Confirmed cases
- Building plumbing / treatment
- Utility strategy
- Emerging test methods



Microcystin

- EPA 10 day HA
- Rec exposure
- Drinking water exposure
- Treatment options



Manganese

- Secondary contaminant at 0.05mg/L
- Frequently found
- EPA HA 0.3mg/L
- Measured at source
- Distribution exposure?

4. Lab Rule

WAC 246-390 Drinking water lab certification and data reporting.



5. Reclaimed Water Rule

WAC 173-219

Encourage use of reclaimed water / regulatory framework.



6. Group B Rule

WAC 246-291

Establish design and construction standards for Group B systems.

7. State Revolving Fund

2018 Construction loan cycle - \$25M 2018 Emergency grant / loan - \$200K
