

This can leave underserved communities holding the ball (one they didn't necessarily ask for)


Agencies have started to focus on building long-term relationships with organizations

Is more engagement always better, as long as we are providing compensation?

I think this model lacks a focus on two critical factors

- Community priorities (independent of our project)
- Community capacity

It works best if we start with thinking about community interests without us in the picture!

Jobs and economic opportunity
Health and wellness
Cultural representation and preservation
Livable communities

We can start with jobs!




King County Wastewater Treatment Division collaborated with South Seattle College to host a job fair

Help develop the internal workforce needed by King County and skilled tradespeople for construction It can be about project amenities and it can also be about how we do outreach

We can advocate to align our efforts with community values without having to engage community in every decision

Equity and social justice are about outcomes that align with community priorities



We also need to think about community capacity and the opportunity cost of engaging with us
